The facts so far on the Grenfell Tower fire – By Peter Crum

The fire seems to have started by a fridge exploding in one of the flats but it spread to all the building. It is thought to be the cladding on the outside of the building that made it spread so fast.

The fire broke out at 1am on Wednesday morning at the Grenfell tower in north Kensington. Fire fighters arrived at the scene in six minutes and have been working there ever since.

Emergency services are helping the people who live there, and the London fire brigade said they could rescue, many people very early on. But sadly, at least 80 people are known to have died and many are injured in the fire.




There has been a lot of anger about how it was handled by the Council but people are pleased with lots of help from local voluntary organisations.

Themes include:


- Children in the mines

We recently went to see Pack it. We met Helen. She told us they rent store space and some of their customers want their products sent out and the trainees pick out the products and some of the trainees do the I.T.

They have different training programmes. They work towards various key skills. Helen took us on a tour of the warehouse and showed us some of products which they storage and send out which included everything from:-

- Tea
- Salt
- Incontinence pads
- Charcoal
- Birds seeds and feeders
- Traffic cones



And many more products.

After we talked to Helen we went to see Pink Mountain which is where they pack the Himalayan salt. We talked to Paul who said, “good laugh here they are good people.” Paul went on to tell us how they measure out the salt and charcoal.

We went to see the packaging department where the trainees were working with bolts and washers.

We interviewed Neil about pack it and he said “Pack it is a very important job I do, I have all sorts of jobs to do, my favourite is making the traffic cones, I also like working Pink Mountain packing the salt and I help Helen in the mailing room.”

We thought Neil worked very hard but seemed very happy at Pack IT.

Then we spoke to Simon the manager of Pack IT.

Generally, he told us about the day to day running of Pack IT and how Pack IT have developed over the years. Simon was passionate about his jobs.

Peter said “I felt they were very welcoming and the space was fantastic. The projects were good. I found the work interesting and I’m thinking I might like to work there.”

Lisa said “It was very good and I did enjoy visiting Pack IT and I like it and some of the things they did. I enjoyed it”.

Tracy said “I like everything especially the space and I like looking at all the stocks and enjoy the blending room and the smells of tea was fantastic.

All the trainee's that attend Pack It Hereford are on an OCR accredited training program. The trainee's work on selected modules and once the module is complete OCR assess the work and if you pass they issue a lovely certificate. OCR (Oxford, Cambridge & RSA) is an examination board that sets examinations and awards qualifications (including GCSEs and A-levels)

These certificates are great to add to your portfolio of documents you can take along to job interviews to prove you have work place skills.

We have 14 adults with learning difficulties who currently attend Pack It Hereford using their Direct Payment Personal Budget


