Stephen Hawking – By Laura Joliffe

The English physicist and mathematician who made a big difference to cosmology (study of space), died at the age of 76 on March 14th 2018. He suffered from amyotrophic lateral sclerosis (ALS) a rare and life-threatening condition, but that did not stop him. Here are some of his most inspiring and interesting quotes:

1. If you are disabled, it is probably not your fault, but it is no good blaming the world or expecting it to take pity on you. One has to have a positive attitude and must make the best of the situation that one finds oneself in...
2. In my opinion, one should concentrate on activities in which one's physical disability should not present a serious handicap.
3. I have managed however, only because of the large amount of help I have received from my wife, children, colleagues and students. I find that people in general are very ready to help, but you should encourage them to feel that their efforts to aid you are worthwhile by doing as well as you possibly can.
4. Although I cannot move and I have to speak through a computer, in my mind I am free.
5. Life would be tragic if it weren't funny.
6. I'm not afraid of death but I'm in no hurry to die I have so much I want to do first.
7. Where there is life, there's hope.
8. My advice to other disabled people would be concentrate on things your disability doesn't prevent you doing well and don't regret the things it interferes with. Don't be disabled in spirit as well as physically.



Young Persons' Network interview panel – By Peter Crum

The Young Person's Network is being led by 20-year-old Cameron Wood, from the Whitecross area of Hereford, who has had Cerebral Palsy and Hydrocephalus since birth.

The Network has been designed for young disabled people aged between 11 and 18 and will give feedback to Hereford council with any issues that the group feel need to change the quality of their lives. It will give young disabled people in Herefordshire more voice.

The Young Person's Network have been invited to join a young people's interview panel on Friday 16th February at Plough Lane from 9 - 4.30pm.

It will interview candidates for the new Assistant Director post for Children's Safeguarding Directorate of Herefordshire Council. The panel will run all day and will help the Council decide on the best person for the job. Herefordshire Council are going to be listening to people with a learning disability which is very good.


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Community Cafe - By Lisa Perkins

History of the Ross-on-Wye Market House - by Adrian Phipps

The Market Hall was built between 1650 and 1654, replacing an older probably wooden building, and is now used as the Ross Heritage Centre.

Regular markets are still held under and in front of the Market House.

It is believed that the upper doorway that can be seen on the side, was the original entrance that was accessed via a wooden staircase added after 1690.

The clock tower was a later addition and dates from the 18th Century (1900's) although it may well have replaced an earlier structure removed due to problems sealing it with the roof.

We visited Wessington Court Farm in Woolhope, which is part of Star College, and were met by Jon, Shelley, and other students.

Jon and Shelly work with people aged 19-24 years old, and their aim is to get people into a paid job.

They take up to 8 people, and study for 1 year. The first thing they do is have breakfast and what jobs they are doing that day.

The first job is about jobs on the farm, like driving the tractor and looking after the animals on the farm. They always check the machinery that they use.

Then they work on qualifications for Maths, English and other qualifications.

Shelly's job is Job Coach, which is to help them find jobs and work placements. Each student has their own subject on which to study.

One of the students, Lee, was working in the Grafton Inn as a kitchen porter.

Jeremy does work with March's Family Network, and wanted to find a job as a youth worker. (Continued page 5...)



Star college continued....


We talked to them about ONOV, and what we do, how we fund it and that there were 1 or 2 places for people to join after they finished Wessington.

We then asked if people wanted to come to Wessington, how they would apply. Jon told us they would have to make contact through National Star College. The college gets referrals from schools, colleges, and social workers.

We asked the students if they felt more prepared for work after Wessington, and Lee said that he has now got a CV and an e-mail address that Shelly helped him to set up. As Jeremy has now finished Star College, they are helping him find another job coach. Shelly went on to say that they helped not only job search, but also how far you are able to travel on your own. And she tends their interviews, helping them settle in their jobs. We asked the students what was their best time at Wessington, and Jeremy said it was getting a paid job and succeeding in his life with Shelly and Jon.

Finally we asked Jon and Shelly the same question, and Jon said: "seeing the students develop, and also seeing their confidence and independence grow." Then he said: "I am a farmer."

Shelly said that for her it was the seeing the students setting out to see what they do. We found Star College was a nice, friendly place to visit, and seeing how students are supported into their own work. Please see the advert on page 2.

The Right For Women To Vote - Until 100 years ago, women in the UK were not allowed to vote.

Here are some facts about how that changed:

- 1 The law that gave some women the chance to vote was called "The representation of the people Act." But you had to be over 30 and a property owner or well Educated. And became law in 1918.
- 2 British Women would not get same rights to vote as men until 1928.
- 3 Women could already vote in countries like Finland, Norway, Denmark, and Australia.
- 4 Some women wanted to take violent action to change the law. But Emmeline Pankhurst a famous Women's Leader said" Not a cat or a canary to be killed no life".
- 5 The USA did not allow women to vote in all states until 1920.
- 6 Since women in the UK got the vote there has only been one queen. This is Queen Elizabeth" who became Queen 1952 and still is today;
- 7 There have been two female Prime Ministers of the UK, Margaret Thatcher and Theresa May.
- 8 Since the last Election There are Record numbers of women MPs 208 out of 690. Do you think after 100 years of women being able to vote that there should be Equal Numbers of men and women MPs?




