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
## Learning Disability Partnership Board meeting -



The brain weigh's just 3 pounds.


Even though the brain is just 2% of your body weight, It uses around 20% of all your energy from the blood and oxygen in your body.

Warwick castle is medieval castle developed from a wooden fort, ordinarily built by William the conqueror in 1068.

Several members of royalty and earls have lived at Warwick Castle over the years. King Edward IV was locked up in the dungeons during the war of the Roses.

It is home to the worlds most powerful catapult, it is an old medieval Launching weapon, the most powerful in the world and roughly the height of 3 Houses and can throw objects up to 1000 metres and it holds many records over the years.

Falconry would have been a major activity at the castle in medieval times, it has lots of Birds of prey including a Stella sea eagle with a wing span of 8ft and the UK's only free flying Andean Condor with a wing span of over 10ft.

## Skiing — By Laura Joliffe

Skiing has a history of almost a thousand years although modern Skiing has changed from its beginnings in Scandinavia.

It may have been practiced more than 100 centuries ago, in what is now China, according to old paintings.



The word ski is one of a handful of words that Norway has spread from the old Norse word skia which means split piece of wood (fire wood). In Finland and Sweden until at least the late 1800's they used different skis on each foot. On one foot the skier wore a long straight non arching ski for sliding and a shorter one was worn on the other foot for kicking. The underside of the short one was either plain or covered with animal skin for grip and the other one that held the weight of the skier was treated with animal fat in a similar manner to now when skiers use wax.



Early skiers used one long pole. The first picture of a skier with two ski poles dates to 1741.


Skiing was mostly used for transport until the 1800's. But since then it has also been for fun and sport.
