

Bastille Day 14th Jul 2022 French national day, celebrating the storming of the Bastille prison in Paris, which signalled the start of the French Revolution.


St. Swithuns Day 15th Jul 2022 According to legend, if it rains today, it will continue to rain for 40 days and 40 nights.


Poetry Corner

Monday – we went to Split – we enjoyed the city and we watched the changing of the guards then went out for lunch – PJ had tuna steak and Tracy had grilled chicken.


Tuesday – we went to Omis again for breakfast then came back for a pool afternoon.


Friday - we went down to the beach and had a pool afternoon in the evening we had a photo shoot down by the beach followed by a family meal.

History of the Orient Express — By Adrian Phipps

The Orient Express was a long-distance passenger train service created in 1883 by the Belgian company “Compagnie Internationale des Wagons-Lits” that operated until 2009. The train travelled via the length of continental Europe and into western Asia, with terminal stations in London in the northwest and Athens or Istanbul in the southeast.

On the 5th June 1883, the first “Express d’Orient” left Paris for Vienna. Vienna remained the terminus until the 4th October 1883. The train was officially re-named the Orient Express in 1891.

The original route, which first ran on the 4th October 1883, was from Paris, Gare de l’Est, to Gieirgiu in Romania via Munich and Vienna.

In 1889, the train’s eastern terminus became Varna in the Principality of Bulgaria, where passengers could take a ship to Constantinople. On the 1st June 1889, the first direct train to Constantinople left Paris.

The 1930s saw the Orient Express services at its most popular, with three parallel services running: the Orient Express, the Simplon Orient Express, and also the Arlberg Orient Express, which ran via Zurich and Innsbruck to Budapest, with sleeper cars running onwards from there to Bucharest and Athens.



There is a good chance you may be familiar with the Orient Express. It is after all one of the most famous luxury trains in history.



Let's learn some more with these facts about the Orient Express:

Its journeys have varied in length: It is best known for its journeys from Paris to Istanbul. However, shorter journeys were also possible, such as London to Paris. The train is also known for making trips around European nations that include Vienna, Berlin and Prague.

One of the classic journeys was actually a rarity to book: The 6-day journey from Paris to Istanbul and back again could only be selected once a year! Warmth was not a problem: With the assistance of coal stoves, each carriage was kept nice and warm. A small radiator was also included in the carriages. There were multiple services in the 30s : The 1930s was when the Orient Express was at its peak of popularity. At this time there were three parallel services running under the 'Express' group.

Nevertheless it is a dynamic, attractive Spanish city with a castle, old quarter and long waterfront.


